Dear Friends,

The story in today's gospel is perhaps Jesus' most famous parable, the Good Samaritan. Because we are so removed from the culture of his day, we can overlook the true significance of the point that Jesus was making. He wasn't just telling us to be nice to people in need. The assailants had left the man who had fallen into their hands for dead. This condition left him ritually unclean for anyone who was going to Jerusalem and its Temple. This meant that neither the priest nor the Levite could touch the poor fellow to see if they could be of help, for to do so would have made it impossible for them to worship in the Temple.

The fact that a Samaritan was able to help the man was not lost on those around Jesus. This foreigner wasn't governed by the norms of Judaism, even though Samaritans held beliefs about God that were similar to their Jewish neighbors. He was forbidden to worship in the Temple because he was part of a despised group, as unclean as the man who fell in with the robbers. Oddly enough, though, this left him free to do what the others couldn't do. He could help the victim and by doing so, he fulfilled the Law far better than the others did. This was the point that the Lord was trying to make. Giving assistance to another isn't just an act of kindness. It is to *worship God* by loving our neighbor.

The folks of Jesus' day had religious rules to direct where, when, and for whom they could be of assistance. Very often, as in the parable, the rules became more important than the spirit behind them. In our day, we have a new set of "rules:" the constraints of our jobs, school, and sports, as well as our own personal preferences, which limit our freedom to be available to the Lord, which, in turn, makes it hard to have the time to be available to others in need.

One of the things that I love about the Mass is that it is set up to offset the numbing effect of the new rules that control so much of our lives. Rather than teaching us that there are "religious areas" and "non-religious areas" to life, the two central parts of the Mass are meant to help us become more sensitive to the very ordinary ways that God is with us. The Liturgy of the Word corresponds to times when we are in conversations with each other, sharing ideas and experiences about the meaning and purpose of life. The other is the Liturgy of the Eucharist, which corresponds to those times when we're at meals and sharing family and friendship with each other. In both experiences, we are led by the drama of the celebration to recognize that our relationship with Christ is in and through our relationships with each other.

The Liturgy helps us experience that when it comes to God we can't divide life up into areas where he's important and areas where he isn't. If we want to be true to God and to our hearts, then we have to be true to him wherever we are *because he is wherever we are*. If we are not true to him, i.e. if we don't put him first above all other activities and relationships, then we can't be true to our desire to love others. We start using even those we're closest to for our own ends. The Samaritan was worshipping God because his care for the victim was free of self-serving motivations. He knew what was good and he acted on it. The story Jesus told is, in part, a story about those who believed in those nice, neat divisions and thus missed a more immediate chance to worship.

The same thing can happen to us for different reasons. Where their religious rules often created neat, but false, divisions between the respectable and the non-respectable, our more secular rules create neat, but false, divisions for where we can find God and where we shouldn't look for him. The Mass can help to desensitize us to those false divisions. Because it reveals that Christ is with us in *all of our activities*, we don't have to fall into the trap of missing opportunities to worship him by acting on behalf of what is good *wherever we are*. Of course, this does mean taking the Liturgy more seriously than we tend to do today. It might be worthwhile for each of us to ask ourselves where we are in the story Jesus told. How seriously do we worship the Lord?

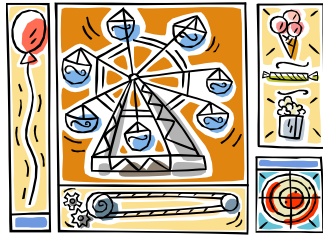
